Pupil Premium Report for the academic year 2015/16

with forecast for 2016/17

Introduction

The Pupil Premium is additional funding given to schools so that they can support particular groups of pupils who are known to be at risk of underachievement and close the attainment gap between them and their peers (now known as the disadvantaged group of children). The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools for pupils from Reception that are known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM) or who have been eligible for FSM in the past six years (Ever 6). It is also allocated to schools for looked after children, and from April 2014 this was extended for children adopted from care.

Our School

Danehill School currently has 79 pupils on roll. County funds are allocated for pupils currently eligible for free school meals and for pupils who have had free school meals over the last six years. Additional funds are also available for looked after children or children adopted from care.

Looking back

How much Pupil Premium we received last academic year 2015-2016

For the last academic year Danehill School received £7,816 in pupil premium funding.

How we spent the money in the academic year 2015-2016

Last year the focus was supporting pupils in raising standards to age related for their year group. This was done by the methods outlined below, focusing on academic attainment as well as emotional well-being. Reports were given to governors and monitored on a regular basis.

The impact of the spending on the pupils for whom pupil premium was paid

In reading, 3 out of 4 pupils for whom Pupil Premium Grant was received made expected or better than expected progress and 1 made progress below the expected level. In writing, 2 pupils made expected progress and 2 made better than expected progress. In maths, 2 pupils made progress below the expected level and 2 pupils made better than expected progress.

Attendance

Attendance for these pupils ranged from 97.7% to 100% and on average attendance was 99.3% (average of 96.2% after 2 disadvantaged children left the school).

Exclusions

There were zero exclusions for this group of pupils.

Extra curricular activities

Last year all the KS2 pupils participated in at least one extra-curricular activity or club. As senior students, year 6 pupils took responsibilities in school for lunch duties, setting up assemblies, and supporting younger children.

Parental engagement

There was a very good level of attendance of parents/carers at parental consultations and review meetings.

Looking ahead**How much Pupil Premium we have received this year**

For this academic year, 2016-17, Danehill School has received £4,188 in pupil premium funding for the September – March period.
